To provide quality comprehensive behavioral health services to the residents of our community.



Our Vision

To support the development of a healthy, caring, and safe community while responding to its evolving needs.

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Dear Friends,

As we reflect on 2025, I am grateful for the progress we have made together toward building a healthier, more resilient community. This year we celebrated a major milestone with the groundbreaking of North View, Permanent Supportive Housing in December. Once complete, North View will provide 36 units of safe, stable housing for individuals and families living with behavioral health needs—an essential step in addressing homelessness.

We also strengthened our Outreach Teams, which now include PATH, Peer Pathfinder, the REAL Team (Recovery, Empowerment, Advocacy and Linkage), and Forensic PATH.

Our clinicians continue to integrate Evidence-Based Practices, including EMDR, TF-CBT, DBT, PCIT, Motivational Interviewing, WISe, and RUBI Parent Training. These approaches ensure that care is effective, compassionate, and tailored to the needs of the people we serve.

Beyond clinical care, PBH is a cornerstone of the local economy, employing 150+ full-time staff and stewarding an annual budget of \$19.4 million. More than 60% of our jobs exceed the Recompete wage threshold of \$26/hour, and our capital projects inject additional funds into the community by paying prevailing wages.

I'm thrilled to share that PBH has been selected as one of only ten provider agencies statewide to join Washington's Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) Pre-Certification Cohort beginning January 1, 2027—a recognition of our team's professionalism, collaboration, and dedication to expanding high-quality, personcentered care as we prepare for potential full certification pending state and federal approval.

We also face challenges. The impacts of the "One Big Beautiful Bill" raise concerns for behavioral health. Changes such as reduced state-directed payments, capping Medicaid at Medicare rates, lowering WA FMAP, and doubling reporting requirements risk increasing the number of uninsured, driving up uncompensated care, and straining both PBH and hospital systems. These shifts could mean longer wait times, higher use of emergency departments, and increased incarceration and homelessness.

Even so, I remain hopeful. Our staff, partners, and supporters continue to show that we are strongest when we work together. With your partnership, PBH will remain at the forefront of advancing accessible, evidence-based behavioral health care in Clallam County.

Thank you for standing with us. Together, we are proving that hope starts here.

2025 Community Needs Assessment Survey

From May 19-June 13, 2025, Peninsula Behavioral Health conducted a Community Needs Assessment (CNA) to help us understand the evolving behavioral health priorities of Clallam County residents, identify service gaps, and guide program planning and funding decisions. The survey highlights both strong community trust in PBH and ongoing challenges in access, workforce stability, and coordination of care.

Strong Awareness & Trust:

- 90% of respondents currently receive services at PBH.
- Of those who don't, 91% have heard of PBH.
- 42% say PBH is the first place they go for mental health or substance use help.



Youth & Family Services

At Peninsula Behavioral Health, we believe that every child deserves the opportunity to grow, heal, and thrive in a safe and supportive environment. Our Youth & Family Services Department provides compassionate, trauma-informed care to children, teens, and families across Clallam County.

Our skilled team of therapists, case managers, and peer specialists work closely with schools, healthcare providers, and community partners to address mental health and behavioral challenges early—building resilience and strengthening family connections. Services include individual and family therapy, psychiatric care, Wraparound Intensive Services (WISe), school-based counseling, and parent support. Each service is designed to meet families where they are, offering both in-person and community-based support.



In 2025, PBH expanded its Sequim office to include a new Youth & Family Treatment Room—a vibrant, play-based therapy space made possible through the generosity of Soroptimist International of Sequim. This room provides a welcoming, safe space where children can express themselves through creativity and play as they work toward healing.


